An induction loop is available for those who are hard of hearing. Please turn your hearing aid to the 'T' setting.

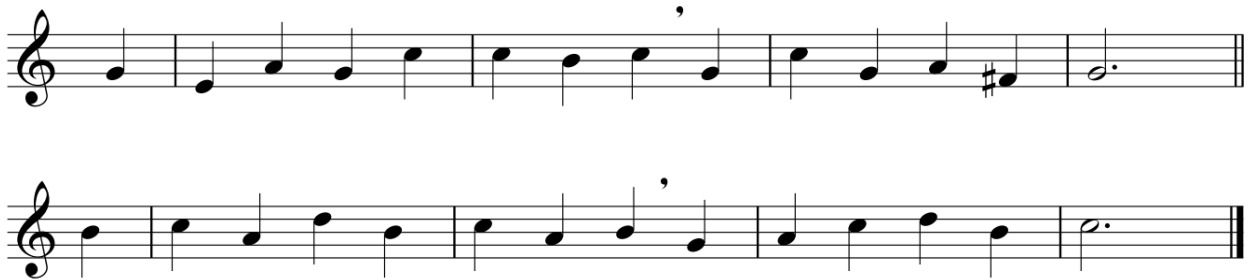
Organ music is played before the service.

The Greeting and Introduction

Officiant

I welcome you this afternoon as we remember with thanksgiving the lives and work of those who served in the Falklands conflict in 1982.

We remember all the service personnel who were injured or killed in the course of that campaign and particularly we pray also for the former company of each ship bearing the name HMS Sheffield.

On this day, we recall how HMS Sheffield D80 was hit by an Exocet missile on 4 May 1982 whilst on patrol near the Falkland Islands. The missile attack killed twenty sailors and many others sustained burns. Some of those went to an early grave years later, notably Captain Salt.

Mindful of the sacrifice made by so many who served in the South Atlantic, it is with sorrow that we acknowledge the divisions and violence of our world, and with confidence in the risen Christ that we now pray for his peace to be established amongst all peoples.

All these our thoughts, prayers and hopes let us offer to God in the words our Saviour Christ taught us, saying:

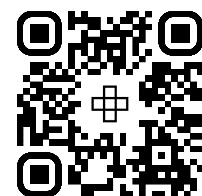

We understand that it is the responsibility of each one of us to protect children, young people and adults from physical, emotional and sexual abuse, and from neglect. Together we can build a community where everyone can flourish.
